



It's Time We Go **ALL-IN** on Sustainability and Climate Action

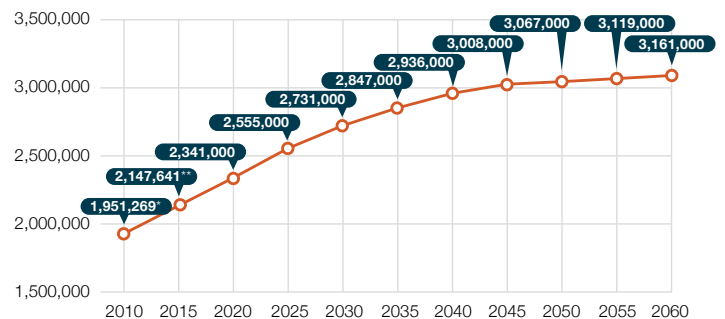

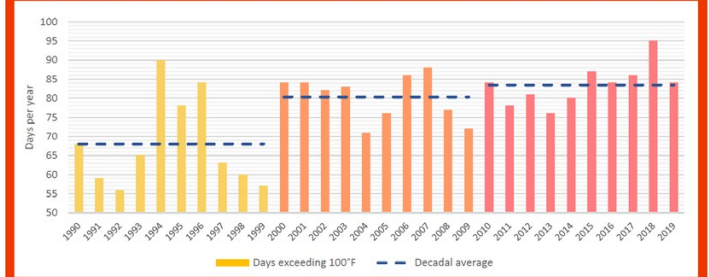
Clark County Population Forecast (2010-2050)

IT'S GETTING HOTTER IN SOUTHERN NEVADA

Southern Nevada is the fastest warming region in the U.S., with temperatures increasing more than 5°F since 1970, according to recent research. The number of days exceeding 100°F has also seen the rise in recent decades, as shown in the chart below.



All-In Clark County Planning Process Timeline





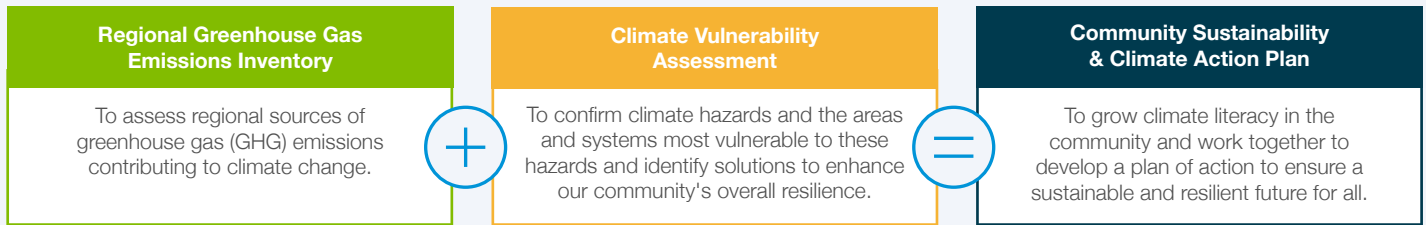
Collective Action for a Sustainable Clark County

In early 2021, the Clark County Board of Commissioners approved the *All-In Clark County* Plan for Government Operations. We are now embarking on three additional efforts under the *All-In Clark County* umbrella to continue to lead the region to a more sustainable future.



Clark County will be a national leader in:

- 1 reducing our greenhouse gases, the pollutants that contribute to climate change, and
- 2 preparing residents and businesses for climate impacts



The Greenhouse Gas Inventory and the Climate Vulnerability Assessment are foundational technical efforts that we are developing with the support of our municipalities and state and regional partners. These two efforts will provide the information necessary to develop a robust, actionable Community Plan.
